MARY LUDLOW JOHNSON

Student of the Year - Environmental / Occupational Health

This award is given to a graduating student in each emphasis area who absolutely knocked our socks off in a variety of ways; whose overall performance in our program, including academic achievements, contributions to the Department, contributions to the field of public health, service to others, and commitment to improving public health indicates a strong potential for the student to achieve future greatness in the field, thus helping us to realize our Department's vision of being the alma mater of the most influential leaders in public health.

"Mary was our Environmental and Occupational Health (EOH) lab manager for over 1.5 years, was an excellent teaching assistant for HLTH 428: Occupational Exposure Assessment Laboratory for Jim Johnston last semester, and was my research assistant from May 2019 to December 2020. She was superb. As my research assistant, she taught herself how to do very complex SAS programming (and never took SAS programming classes, classes on programming with other software/languages, or software-based biostatistics classes). I honestly think she was a better SAS programmer than many and maybe even most of the Epidemiology Emphasis students I had in my advanced epidemiology class (HLTH 449: Epidemiologic Study Design and Analysis) last semester. She did a ton of preparatory work (i.e., data cleaning, variable creation, etc.) for my temperature inversion and air pollution datasets (and they're absolute beasts because they're huge and not natively formatted in a useful way). She also got very far on an extremely complex analysis of the association between temperature inversions and emergency department visits for epilepsy (a topic she chose). This analysis required her to use three types of distributed lag models (i.e., unconstrained, constrained quadratic polynomial, and moving average) in the framework of conditional logistic regression models using a time-stratified, casecrossover study design, explore using regression splines to adjust for confounders, use multiple imputation to account for bias from missing data, and evaluate effect measure modification of associations by age, sex, and encounter (i.e., visit) type. Not only is the paper the first ever to address the topic she chose, but I've never seen a paper use all of those methods in the same paper and she did (as an EOH student who didn't have experience programming or conducting statistical analyses with any software package when she started working with me in May 2019). She also got a College Undergraduate Research Award for her project and would have presented her research at a conference last year if COVID-19 hadn't struck. She wrote about half of the journal article for her project (the rest will be finished after we receive updated data and can finish the statistical analyses). She was the ideal research assistant and I was sad (for myself and my research) when she graduated. Although I didn't use the EOH labs much, she was always ready, willing, available, and able to help me when I did need help. She also reorganized the EOH labs, barcoded all of the equipment, and developed an app to be used to check out and keep track of equipment (and she didn't know how to make an app before that). She also started a club at BYU with her husband to address homelessness. To summarize, Mary did very well in the classroom (3.81 GPA), demonstrated excellent self-motivation and self-teaching abilities as the EOH lab manager and my research assistant, was an excellent teaching assistant, and was one of the most impressive research assistants I've ever had (and I've had a lot of awesome research assistants). Mary was also quietly confident, thoughtful, persistent, humble, teachable, intelligent, dependable, etc. Thus, Mary was the total package."
